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Management's Responsibility

To the Members of UFV Student Union Society:

Management is responsible for the preparation and presentation of the accompanying financial statements, including responsibility for significant accounting judgments and estimates in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. This responsibility includes selecting appropriate accounting principles and methods, and making decisions affecting the measurement of transactions in which objective judgment is required.

In discharging its responsibilities for the integrity and fairness of the financial statements, management designs and maintains the necessary accounting systems and related internal controls to provide reasonable assurance that transactions are authorized, assets are safeguarded and financial records are properly maintained to provide reliable information for the preparation of financial statements.

The Board of Directors is composed primarily of Directors who are neither management nor employees of the Society. The Board is responsible for overseeing management in the performance of its financial reporting responsibilities, and for approving the financial information included in the annual report. The Board fulfils these responsibilities by reviewing the financial information prepared by management and discussing relevant matters with management and external auditors. The Board is also responsible for recommending the appointment of the Society's external auditors.

MNP LLP is appointed by the Members to audit the financial statements and report directly to them; their report follows. The external auditors have full and free access to, and meet periodically and separately with, both the Board and management to discuss their audit findings.

Independent Auditors' Report

To the Members of UFV Student Union Society:

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of UFV Student Union Society, which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2017, and the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of UFV Student Union Society as at March 31, 2017 and the results of its operations, changes in net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

1. Incorporation and nature of the Society

UFV Student Union Society (the "Society") is incorporated under the authority of the Societies Act of British Columbia and is registered as a not-for-profit organization and thus is exempt from income taxes under the Income Tax Act (the "Act"). In order to maintain its status as a registered not-for-profit organization under the Act, the Society must meet certain requirements within the Act. In the opinion of management these requirements have been met.

The Society's purpose is to create a strong, unified student voice and to provide innovative and valuable services to its members by advocating on behalf of and collaborating with the Student Body, the University of the Fraser Valley, and the community.

2. Significant accounting policies

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations as issued by the Accounting Standards Board in Canada using the following significant accounting policies:

Fund accounting

The Society follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions, and maintains two funds: Operating Fund and Health and Dental Plan Fund.

The Operating Fund reports the Society's revenue and expenses related to program delivery and administrative activities.

The Health and Dental Plan Fund reports the Society's assets, liabilities, revenue and expenses related to the management and delivery of health and dental benefits to eligible students.

Revenue recognition

The Society uses the deferral method of accounting for contributions and reports on a fund accounting basis. Restricted contributions, including student fees and Health and Dental Plan fees collected, and investment income are recognized as revenue of the appropriate fund in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the Operating Fund when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Revenues for food and beverage sales are recognized when services are provided and payment is collected.

Unrestricted investment income is recognized as revenue in the Operating Fund when earned.

Capital assets

Purchased capital assets are recorded at cost. Contributed capital assets are recorded at fair value at the date of contribution if fair value can be reasonably determined.

Amortization is provided using the following methods, at rates intended to amortize the cost of assets over their estimated useful lives. Assets not in use, or under construction, are not amortized.

Measurement uncertainty (use of estimates)

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period.

Accounts receivable are stated after evaluation as to their collectibility and an appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts is provided where considered necessary. Provisions are made for slow moving and obsolete inventory. Amortization is based on the estimated useful lives of capital assets.

These estimates and assumptions are reviewed periodically and, as adjustments become necessary they are reported in excess of revenues and expenses in the periods in which they become known.

Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Cost is determined by the first in, first out method. Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less estimated costs of completion and selling costs.

Long-lived assets and discontinued operations

Long-lived assets consist of capital assets. Long-lived assets held for use are measured and amortized as described in the applicable accounting policies.

When the Society determines that a long-lived asset no longer has any long-term service potential to the society, the excess of its net carrying amount over any residual value is recognized as an expense in the statement of operations. Writedowns are not reversed.

3. Marketable securities

Marketable securities are held with BMO Financial Group and carried at fair market value.

5. Prepaid lease

The prepaid lease dated July 1, 2015 is between the Society and the University of the Fraser Valley for the use of the Student Union Building. The term of the lease is 30 years. During the year, \$339,092 (2016 - \$254,319) was recognized as a lease expense.

6. Accounts payable and accruals

Included in accounts payable is \$4,348 (2016 - \$7,793) of government remittances payable.

7. Deferred revenue

Deferred revenue includes Health and Dental Plan fees received by March 31, 2017, which relate to the 2018 fiscal year.

11. Financial instruments

The Society, as part of its operations, carries a number of financial instruments. It is management's opinion that the Society is not exposed to significant currency, credit, liquidity or other price risks arising from these financial instruments.

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the value of a financial instrument might be adversely affected by a change in the interest rates. In seeking to minimize the risks from interest rate fluctuations, the Society manages exposure through its normal operating and financing activities. The Society is exposed to interest rate price risk on its mortgages with a fixed interest rate

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Society will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Society's exposure to liquidity risk is mainly dependent on the collection of student fees to meet commitments and sustain operations. The Society has entered into transactions to borrow funds from financial institutions for which repayment is required at various maturity dates.

13. Correction of an error

During the year, the Society determined that the Student Union Building was incorrectly recorded as a capital asset instead of a prepaid lease. The Society entered into the lease with a payment of basic rent in the form of a prepaid lease with an initial 30 year term starting July 1, 2015. The result of this correction was a decrease in capital assets of \$10,172,745, an increase in prepaid lease of \$10,172,745, a decrease in amortization expense of \$386,139, and an increase in lease payment expense of \$254,319. For 2016 the impact of this correction has resulted in an increase in net assets of \$131,821.
